


Clinical Nurse Specialist



A pediatric clinical nurse specialist (CNS) is an advanced practice registered nurse who has graduate level education to provide direct care, diagnoses, and treatment for patients. As leaders in evidence-based practice across the continuum of wellness and illness, CNSs can work in acute care settings such as hospitals, but they also practice in primary care.

Pass the national Acute Care CNS - Pediatrics (ACCNS-P) certification exam and apply for state licensure as a CNS.
