

Introduction

Infographics of career opportunities for pediatric Registered Nurses (RNs) and Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) can be valuable tools in the nursing classroom. We have developed more than 20 infographics that are effective for student use due to their visual appeal, ease of understanding, and ability to convey information concisely.

In this Educator's Guide we offer suggestions for integrating the infographics into your classroom activities. These suggestions enhance learning by engaging nursing students, facilitating discussions, and providing practical insights into the numerous career opportunities available to pediatric nursing professionals.



Pediatric Nurse Scientist

Career Steps

- 1 Obtain your BSN and pass the NCLEX exam. Apply for RN licensure through your State Board of Nursing, then gain work experience as a pediatric RN.
- 2 Pursue either a PhD or a doctorate of nursing practice (DNP) with a research/evidence-based practice focus.
- 3 Seek your Certified Pediatric Nurse (CPN) credential from PNCB.
- 4 Participate in research studies, translation of knowledge, and other scholarly activities (writing, publishing, presenting, grant writing, teaching evidence-based practice, etc.).
- 5 Identify a nurse scientist mentor in order to learn about the unique role and qualifications needed, as well as how to structure a program.
- 6 Start your job search at PNCB's career center: <https://careers.pncb.org/jobseekers/> using terms like nurse scientist, nurse researcher, evidence-

Group Activities

For the group activities listed below, provide nursing students with printed or digital copies of the pediatric nursing career path infographics. Divide nursing students into small groups and assign each group one of the pediatric nurse career paths.

Interactive Infographic Analysis

During the first part of the class, have each group analyze the assigned infographic exploring the description, keywords, and steps required to achieve the role. In addition, students should visit the links and other resources included in the infographic. At the end of the time allotted, have each group present their findings to the class, highlighting the unique aspects of the selected career path.

Poster Board Displays

Have each group create a visually appealing poster board display incorporating the infographic and supplementing it with additional pictures and information to highlight the selected career path. You may choose to hold a contest for the most eye-catching and influential poster board display. The displays can later serve as visual references for students to explore and discuss during class breaks or free time.

Role-Playing Scenarios

Have each group prepare and perform short role-playing scenarios demonstrating how a pediatric nurse fulfilling the assigned role might interact with children, families, and colleagues. Advise that specific skills and knowledge required for each career opportunity should be made evident through the role-play scenarios.

Collaborative Research Project

Instruct each group to conduct in-depth research on their assigned career path, utilizing the infographic as a starting point. Have each group create a comprehensive presentation or report showcasing their findings, including job outlook, required education and certifications, salary range, and potential career advancement opportunities.

Individual Activities

Career Exploration Stations

Set up different stations in the classroom, each representing a specific pediatric nursing career opportunity. Provide each student with a Career Exploration Survey (available on the next page) to indicate when a station is visited. Have the nursing students rotate through the stations, where they can analyze the infographics, ask questions, and discuss the roles and responsibilities associated with each career path. After exploring each station, students should complete and submit the Career Exploration Survey.

Career Reflection Essays

Ask nursing students to individually reflect on the infographics and select a career opportunity that interests them most. Instruct them to write a reflective essay discussing their reasons for choosing that career path, their personal goals and aspirations, and how they plan to pursue and prepare for that specific career opportunity.

Career Panel Discussion

Invite pediatric nurses working in different practice settings to visit the classroom for a panel discussion. Have the students analyze the infographics before the panel discussion and be prepared to ask questions about the roles and responsibilities, career progression, challenges, and rewards associated with each career opportunity.

Pediatric Nurse Interviews

Encourage nursing students to interview pediatric RNs and APRNs working in different pediatric practice settings, using the infographics to guide their questions. They can record the interviews or summarize the key points to share with the class, providing insights into the firsthand experiences and perspectives of professionals in various pediatric nursing roles.

Portfolio Development

Instruct nursing students to create a career portfolio with information about pediatric nursing career opportunities. They can include the infographics, additional research, personal reflections, and other relevant materials that display their interests. This activity can help them plan and track their career development throughout their nursing education.

Student Directions

Rotate through the Pediatric Nurse Career stations. Stop at each station to analyze the different Pediatric Nurse Career Pathway Infographics. Ask questions and discuss the roles and responsibilities associated with the career opportunity showcased at that station.
